

VOTER ID LAW IS STILL IN EFFECT FOR THE NOVEMBER 8, 2016 ELECTION

There is a misperception that voters no longer have to show IDs to vote. However, Voters will still be asked to show photo ID at the polls for the November Election. There are a couple of changes to the Voter ID law whereby some voters may be eligible to vote without a photo ID.

There are two major changes to the Voter ID Law:

1. When a voter is asked to present a photo ID from List A, the ID can be expired up to 4 years instead of the previous expiration of 60 days.
2. If a voter does not have any of the ID's on List A, a voter will be allowed to fill out a **Reasonable Impediment Declaration** form **AND** present a document from List B. Then the voter will be eligible to vote.

Provided below are the ID's acceptable for List A:

- Texas Driver License issued by the Texas DPS
- Texas Election Identification Certificate issued by the DPS
- Texas personal identification card issued by the DPS
- Texas license to carry a handgun issued by the DPS
- United States military identification card containing the person's photograph
- United States citizenship certificate containing the person's photograph
- United States Passport

Provided below are the ID's acceptable for List B:

- Valid voter registration certificate
- Certified birth certificate
- Current utility bill
- Bank statement
- Government check
- Paycheck
- Any other government document with your **name** and **an address** (original required if it contains a photograph)
